A New Year Message From the President: *Michael Holland*

The 2nd half of 2007 was an important period for SRB. The Federal budget and the \$5 billion Higher Education Endowment Fund to aide capital works and research facilities at Universities and the much needed increase of \$222 million in Commonwealth scholarships means that tertiary education and medical research fared well.

However, the highlight of the year clearly came in September with the SRB AGM in Christchurch. As usual, SRB's meeting was held as part of a joint meeting with ESA and our other partners, so capably organised by Mike Pickford and his team of professionals at ASN. The meeting was strongly attended and hence, financially successful. This success was important as it had been quite a number of years since New Zealand last hosted SRB. It was especially pleasing to see so many graduate students and young investigators in attendance. I am particularly appreciative that Oozoa Biomedical (Sharon and David Mortimer) has agreed to sponsor 2 student awards for the next 3 years. This is highly pleasing when sponsorships for awards are on the decline. A similar thank you goes to Andrew Stammer and all at *Reproduction, Fertility and Development* for their generous sponsorship of a new plenary speaker position. Of course the ongoing support of Merck-Serono and Meat and Livestock Australia should never be forgotten. The science was uniformly of high quality and the program organised by Darryl Russell and his committee was of utmost interest. My thanks go to the local organising committee who exceeded regardless of there being no SRB representative resident in Christchurch! One future challenge is clear. The current format of the meeting is being stretched to capacity by the number of attendees wishing to present their work. This is an excellent "problem" to have and, whilst some rearranging of the program is possible, it is difficult given the needs of our companion societies. At our 2008 meeting in Melbourne, because of scheduling issues peculiar to the venue, we shall not commence until the Monday morning and will continue until midday Thursday rather than finishing on midday Wednesday. Other changes in the program are also being considered in order to expand our meeting by encompassing other smaller Societies with related interests.

I urge you all to strongly consider being in Hawaii in May 2008 for the 1st World Congress on Reproductive Biology. A highlight will no doubt be former SRB President, Marilyn Renfree as a plenary speaker. This will be followed by the SSR Annual Meeting. It has taken many people a lot of years to get SSR, SRB and SSF to a joint meeting and so I hope as many of you will be there as possible.



Finally, we now have a new Government in Canberra with a strong rhetoric in education and some new initiatives in supporting research. It will be most interesting to see how the future plays out. I think it particularly important for our discipline. The results for reproduction in the recent NHMRC and ARC rounds were quite mixed and we need to remind Federal politicians of the many benefits which come from the very broad area of reproductive biology and the contribution it makes to both medicine and animal agriculture.

I take this opportunity to sincerely thank our outgoing council members, Caroline Gargett, Marie Pantaleon, Chris Scott, Tu'uhe Kaitu'u-Lino and Erica Little for their outstanding contribution to the society over the past years. Best wishes to all for a prosperous 2008!

▪ **SRB-RCRH Award for Excellence in Reproductive Biology Research**

The 2007 winner of the SRB-RCRH Award is Eileen McLaughlin from the University of Newcastle.

Eileen completed her PhD in 1992 on the “Effects of Cryopreservation on Human Spermatozoa”. Following this, Eileen took up a Research Associate position at the University



of Bristol, Centre for Reproductive Medicine before attaining a Wellcome Trust Research Fellowship at the University of Bristol, Molecular Genetics Unit. Eileen then moved to Australia and is now a Senior Lecturer in Biological Sciences at the University of Newcastle where she works on early follicular

development, secondary messenger systems and mammalian sperm-egg interactions. Eileen has over 50 publications varying from IVF work in her early career as a Research Assistant to her more recent advances on the molecular mechanisms of sperm capacitation. Congratulations to a very worthy recipient.

▪ **TJ Robinson Travel Award:**

The winner of the TJ Robinson Travel Award is Dr. Katherine Morton from Sydney University. The award recognizes the Society’s Founding President, who championed strong ties with the International Congress of Animal Reproduction, which is held every 4 years. This award will support Katherine’s travel to the 2008 ICAR meeting in Budapest, where she will present her research findings and be the Society’s representative.

2008 SRB Annual Conference Awards

Several awards are available when you register for the 2008 SRB annual conference:

- **Student travel awards:** available to aid in attendance to the annual meeting and is open to all students who are Financial Members or who have applied to be members.
- **Merck-Serono New Investigator Award:** open to financial members enrolled as a postgraduate student or within 2 years of the award of PhD for best abstract and subsequent presentation at the annual meeting.
- **MLA Award:** available to financial members up to 10 years from award of PhD for best presentation on livestock animal species in the SRB program.
- **ANZPRA New Investigator Award:** awarded for the best presentation by an ANZPRA student member at the annual conference.
- **SRB-RCRH Award for Excellence in Reproductive Biology Research:** to recognize an emerging and excellent contributor less than 15 year post-doc who has demonstrated a substantial and sustained contribution to research in the field of Reproductive Biology.

Postgraduate Student Rep Report *Hannah Brown (Aust.)*

The SRB workshop this year was with Sharon Mortimer, Editor in Chief from Reproduction, Fertility and Development. This year's student lunch was with Prof. Marty Matzuk and was highly successful. Marty shared his invaluable advice with the students regarding finding a post-doc position and being a successful post-doctoral researcher.

Again, student feedback included an interest in fostering a mentoring program between senior researchers and students of the SRB. A number of excellent suggestions have been proposed and will be discussed at the next committee meeting.

The student/supervisor mixer, held at Annie's Wine Bar, was a huge success this year with another sell-out event. As had been suggested in past years, a less formal venue and program was selected and this allowed for significant interaction (dancing) between students and supervisors late into the night!

A larger venue will be considered in 2008 in Melbourne, as a significant number of people missed the event due to size constraints.

Student meeting: The annual student meeting provides the students with an opportunity to voice their opinions and to give feedback about the SRB and the scientific meeting. It is also when the SRB travel grants are distributed. This year the society was very generous with the travel grants, for which the students were very grateful.

There were a number of issues discussed at the meeting. These included:

Introduction of the new NZ Student Rep:



Kathryn Askelund from the University of Auckland, Department of Obs & Gyn. Kathryn is supervised by Larry Chamley and is looking at the causes and consequences of trophoblast deportation during human pregnancy.

Election of the new Aust. Student Rep:



Hannah Brown was elected the new Australian Student Rep. Hannah is from the University of Adelaide (Research Centre for Reproductive Health). She works under the supervision of Darryl Russell on the development and function of the lymphatic vasculature in the ovary.

Introduction of a poster session/length of oral presentations: Students agreed that it was potentially necessary to re-introduce a poster session with the growing size of the annual SRB meeting. They also agreed that a presentation of 10 minutes including questions was very short and that they would prefer a poster session to accommodate more presentations, rather than a reduction in oral presentation length. Students proposed that the poster session be a stand-alone session to encourage the best possible audience turn out and that either breakfast (for a breakfast poster session) or drinks at the end of the day be supplied. Students also supported the council's decision that it not be a student poster session but that post-doc researchers and senior researchers will equally be included in the session.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the two out-going student reps, Tu'uhe and Erica for the significant contributions that they made during their terms with the SRB. Publicity Report Sarah Meachem

SRB conference media campaign: One interview was conducted this year with Prof. Louis Guillett, reported by Amanda Morrall from the Christchurch Press (see press release below). Thank you to Darryl Russell from the Program Organising Committee for a fantastic job in helping to dissect out potential talent and stories/hot topics for me to follow up.

The low level of media coverage was quite disappointing this year and was due in part to limited access to media officers to write press releases. Communications offices that were organised to help in New Zealand and Melbourne had staff resign and thus this significantly impacted the media campaign. Similarly, Christchurch has only one media outlet which limits media coverage. Key elements to grab the attention of the NZ media was not just to have a great story, great talent but someone that put the stories into a local context (ie: impact on people that live in Christchurch). We certainly had great stories and great talent. Sue James from MIMR was gracious and wrote the press release with the material supplied. MEDIA RELEASE Monday 3rd September 2007, Christchurch Convention Centre Sex, Global Warming & Environmental Pollution

For over a century, wildlife and other animals have been used to predict the potential effects of changes in the environment on human health.

Studies examining the reproductive biology of a wide range of species from fish to mammals, indicates that exposure to elevated environmental temperature or common environmental pollutants (some pesticides, plasticizers, industrial waste products, chemical stabilizers, pharmaceuticals) can adversely affect the reproductive system.

Prof Louis Guillett, University of Florida, will show that exposure of female rats or alligators either during pregnancy or shortly after birth to pollutants which mimic the hormone estrogen can adversely affect fertility in later life. This suggests that this may be common across a wide range of the female species. A similar response is seen in the daughters of women treated with the drug diethylstilbesterol during pregnancy.

Elevated temperature and some natural plant compounds (phytoestrogens), which are used as dietary supplements, produce similar effects.

Dr Alex Quinn, University of Canberra, has studied the impact of elevated environmental temperature on sex determination in the Australian central bearded dragon lizard. He has shown that increased temperatures can turn genetic males into females showing environmental temperature can override genetics in determining the sex of lizards.

Environmental temperature and pollutants have a direct impact on fertility and sex determination in animals. The implications for human fertility remain uncertain.

These studies will be presented at the Society of Reproductive Biology meeting in Christchurch, New Zealand, September 3 – 5, 2007.

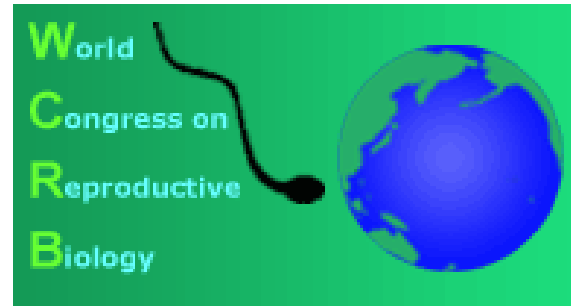

The Australian Society for Medical Research (ASMR) is holding its bi-annual Australian Health and Medical Research Congress (AHMRC) in Brisbane, 16-21 Nov, 2008. The SRB will contribute to the program for the 2008 meeting, by convening a one day symposium entitled "Gamete Development - the Foundation of Life" to be organised by Rob Gilchrist and Sarah Robertson (University of Adelaide). The Symposium will focus on emerging perspectives in gamete biology and their impact on healthy early development. First rate Australian and international speakers will cover basic molecular and cellular mechanisms regulating normal gamete development, through to the extrinsic and intrinsic causes and pathophysiology of infertility, and implications for clinical treatment.

This is an opportunity for reproductive biologists to promote the importance of our research discipline for human health and well-being to the broader biomedical community. All SRB members are urged to mark the Symposium date in their calendar and support the Society by attending this exciting meeting.
